

# Problem-Solving: Teaching Toddlers Social Skills

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#### STEP #1: OFFER UNDERSTANDING

For infants, our main discipline focus is building a secure attachment through attuned interactions using the D.N.A. Process. Older infants and toddlers are impulsive, which often creates conflict as they begin to learn about boundaries and cause-effect. Teaching social skills and setting limits works better when the adult uses the A.C.T. Process.

## D.N.A. Process = Describe, Name, Acknowledge
